<p>Mathematics:</p> <p>This term in maths we will be revising our learning from year 2 in order to prepare us for our new learning. We will be focusing on being a good friend and the characteristics we would expect to see in good teamwork. We will learn how our actions can affect our self and others around us. We will also explore rights, responsibilities, democracy and how they have a voice in the school and wider community. Children will apply this learning to the school’s Kindness Project.</p> <p>Music</p> <p>This term we will be learning to play the recorder. Please have your recorder on Tuesdays.</p> <p>We will also be exploring the sings in preparation for the Harvest Festival.</p> <p>SMSC Links: support spiritual development by encouraging through the experience and emotion of responding to performing, listening and composing music.</p>		<p>French:</p> <p>This term the children will get an introduction the French language learning greetings and introductions - simple greetings, how to say your name and age, introduce family members, numbers 1-10.</p>

Children will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">learn what cave art it and why it was importantexamine Lascaux paintingsexperiment with different types of charcoalcreate their own printing tool <p>SMSC Links: work collaboratively with cooperation and communication, linking to the values of trust and compassion.</p>		
<p>Science</p> <p>Our science unit this term is Rocks. We will be learning about rocks, soils and fossils using experiments to understand and identify similarities and differences between rock types and different soils.</p> <p>The specific outcomes covered are</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">comparing and grouping together different kinds of rocks on the basis of their appearance and simple physical propertiesdescribing how fossils are formed when things that have lived are trapped within rockrecognising that soils are made from rocks and organic matter <p>Some helpful websites:</p>	<p>Religious Education</p> <p>Over the half term, these areas will be explored.</p> <p>The children will be learning about Christianity, what the Bible’s ‘Big Story’ is and what it reveals about having faith in God.
